

## SHELTER UPDATE

The latest renovation of the Epsilon Eta Shelter at 1803 Live Oak in Commerce, Texas, is proving to have been a great investment. The house is holding up well and maintenance has been greatly reduced.

Unfortunately, some unforeseen issues with the house had to be addressed in the renovation. This depleted the funds and some plans and work had to be shelved at the time.

But this last year we finished a major project and replaced all of the windows in the house! Non-opening picture windows were installed in all of the common areas, the upstairs bathroom, and windows facing the front street.

The non-opening windows help with security and provide longer life than traditional opening windows. They are also gridless windows, which improve the curb appeal of the shelter, and the sealed doublepane glass will reduce heating and cooling costs.

The next project is replacing the old vinyl siding on the front, and Bois D'Arc side of the shelter. Some pieces of siding are damaged and broken. If you wish to donate directly to this project just let **David Hitt III '11** know.

Along with the active chapter, Epsilon Eta Educational Foundation hosted a shelter/alumni workday before the 2017 spring semester ended. General repairs and maintenance were primarily performed.

Since the renovation, the active chapter has done a great job of letting the Educational Foundation know of where there were problems with the shelter that needed immediate attention and have assisted whenever needed. The boys are taking care of the shelter and we are very proud of them!

there are four seasons and lots of trees. There is an autobiography by literary critic Willie Morris, North Toward Home, and that title captures my sentiment and that of my wife as we settle in our home in Westminster, Vermont.

#### When did you meet Wylene?

I met Wylene while I was acting provost at Montgomery College in Rockville, Maryland. She was a candidate for a position as a professor in the English



department, and we met when she stopped by the provost's office in August of 1986. We married a year later in June of '87, one of my life's best decisions.

### After 51 years of working in education, how has the community college scene changed?

American community colleges have experienced great change over the last 50 years, and now over 50 percent of all students who enter college begin at one of America's public community colleges. Over the years a significant number of our students have entered with the goal of transferring to a four-year institution. This has led community colleges to expand their programs and articulation agreements with 4-year colleges and universities. Over the last several years, community colleges, out of necessity, have had to re-examine their

commitment to technical education and workforce development. I am pleased that my college, RCC, has met that challenge and has become a leader in workforce training and economic development.

#### Outside of work, what do you do for fun?

I have a great network of friends and a wonderful family, and for me, it is always a pleasure to spend time with them. I have also been actively involved in community service and receive a great deal of personal pleasure from supporting groups and organizations that enhance the quality of life for citizens of all ages.

#### With your retirement approaching, what are you looking forward to most?

As I approach retirement, I look forward to spending more time with my children and grandchildren, who are scattered across America and live in Texas, California, Florida, and New Jersey. When it is mud season in Vermont, I will be basking in the sun with grandchildren in the south, southwest, and west.
