Because of the uncertainty surrounding COVID-19 (Coronavirus) Texas A&M University-Commerce has moved to online-only learning and we don't anticipate the campus opening back up until Fall 2020. This has put our organization in a potentially tough position financially. With careful planning, we are certain we can weather this storm.

At this time many students have returned home leaving the house with very low occupancy. We are facing the very real fact that the chapter will likely not be able to meet their obligation to pay rent - to no fault of their own. It will likely be the fall 2020 semester before campus life is back to normal and we can count on

a full house of undergrads and the rental income that keeps the shelter viable.

Helping these young Delts to come through this potential financial hardship is important to the long-term health of Epsilon Eta.

Dr. Robert "Bob" Williams, Ph.D. '59

Editor's Note: For this edition of the newsletter we're shining the Spotlight on Brother **Bob Williams '59.** From the hometown of Mansfield, Texas, Bob was our very first Chapter Advisor back in 1961. He and his wife Bobbi (called "Red" by most folks because of her flaming red hair) evidently threw some pretty good parties when the chapter first started. Bob taught in the biology department and is a retired Professor of Biology at East Texas State College (now TAMU-C). He holds a B.S. in Agricultural Education and Military Science, Entomology and Zoology for Masters, and a PHD in Entomology with minors in Zoology and Botany. Bob served in Korean War and was honored with the Purple Heart and Silver Star. He remained in the Army Reserves after active duty, and became a Lt. Col. Bob and his wife, Bobbi, have been married for 67 years and they have three grown children: Terry (named after Terry and the Pirates), Stephanie, and Scott.



Parties were held at the M.S.C. Everyone had a good time. Delts were always well-mannered and made a point to visit with me and Bobbi. They did not have alcohol in the party area, but some had "bathroom bars." These Delts were early "boomers" who had been taught rather high standards. The spring outings at state parks were also very enjoyable.

What type of connection did you and your wife "Big Red" have with the active members?

Relationships were very personal. Bobbi was only a couple of years older than the Delts, and they were

very attentive to her. She was invited to dance with the members and their girlfriends enjoyed chatting with her. They were always friendly and very respectful to me. They were always welcome at our home and many of them would come when they were hungry to get a sandwich. In many cases, some of the members would be "going steady," and we would become emotionally involved only to become heart broken when they "broke up."

Why did you decide to become a teacher after graduation?

I was nearly finished with the PhD when the opening for the job occurred. I applied and was accepted. I found that I really enjoyed developing adults. Previously, I had worked in agriculture (extension service and advisor to farmers), had not intended to be a teacher. My family members growing up were farmers with various crops; mostly peanuts.

Which achievements are you most proud of?

I was able to greatly expand my academic horizons far beyond my PhD requirements and was able to enter other fields of teaching. It was a lot of fun and was very rewarding.

DELT SHELTER REPAIRS UPDATE

As you are surely aware, the wear and tear on a fraternity house goes well beyond "normal." Add in the age of the house, and those problems are only compounded. You were there once (it may have been the current shelter, old blue, or even G1), and you know what you did!

Because of this, a big job of the Epsilon Eta Educational Foundation is ensuring that the shelter is not only financially secure, but also physically secure. This means proper maintenance and repairs need to be done often.

For instance, this past summer it was discovered that a piece of roofing had come off and exposed the wood decking. It was likely caused by faulty flashing from a previous roof repair. Water leaked between a wall and some flashing going under the decking. We had to replace two sheets of roof decking, siding, flashing, and a section of rolled roofing on the upper roof of the shelter. Due to your generous donations over the past few years, it was possible for us to handle this repair, and write a check without sweating or passing the hat!

In this process we also discovered significant damage and rot to large sections of fascia and soffit all around the house. We knew it needed repair ... just not how bad it was. This caused a risk not only to the structure, but also to the brothers living in and enjoying the house.

We just completed the exterior repairs needed to the fascia and soffit at a cost of \$4,000. A significant part of this expense was in equipment and labor due to how high off the ground these repairs were! A risk we couldn't ask any brothers to take. It was obviously a



risky situation, and we could see it was a job for the professionals.

We'd also like to brag that this past year, maintenance and repairs were performed on the deck, stair banister, air and heating, exterior doors, bathrooms, electrical, and more.

We had planned a "painting day" on May 16th to paint the interior something other than battleship gray. This event has been cancelled due to the economic impact and safety concerns of COVID-19. We will reschedule a workday/paint day for later this year. We hope to see you there.

As a final note, thank you to all the brothers who have donated their time, money, and talents to maintaining the shelter for future generations of better Delts, and better men!

Jerry Wesson '62 — My first meeting with the members of the Cavaliers was overwhelming. The president of the freshmen Class, Sophomore Class, Senior Class, and the president of the Student Body were all Cavaliers! It was beyond my imagination to think I would be president of the senior class and on the Student Senate in two years! (Remember, I was admitted to ET on scholastic probation!)

One of my favorite memories was ET's first Greek Sing

Song. When we were announced as the winner, we broke spontaneously into the only-Christmas Carol - pinning ceremony - brotherhood song - gospel hymn - we knew... "The Cavalier Song!"

"Put on your old blue bonnet with ET upon it.

It's a damn good college, but we're not for knowledge, so let's raise hell while we're here!"

C-A-V-A-L-I-E-R-SI

Tom Coker '68 — I had the honor of introducing Justice Tom Clark at his speech/Q&A session on the ET Campus as he interacted with students and faculty. As an old country boy from Cooper, Texas, I would have never dreamed that I would one day be privileged to meet such a man. Thank you DTD.

Craig Atherton '62 — I pledged Cavaliers social club in the fall of 1958 and attended ET continuously until summer 1964 when I finished a Master's in Mathematics. Phillip Rutherford '62, Lynn Williams '61, and Fred Turbeville '61 were among my pledge brothers. I would represent the transition from Cavaliers to DTD.

During this time, there were many veterans returning from active duty. One such vet, Joe Lindsay, was the roommate of Jim Boaz '63 and had been a Cavalier. When those guys spoke, you listened. We were fortunate to have them as role models.

Our fraternity house was at the NW corner of Hunt and Monroe - an empty lot as of two years ago. The school started to build some new dorms south and west of the campus to be ready for occupancy in 1960. For each dorm, there were 12 four-person apartments in the dorm. There were two people in each of two bedrooms, with a common bathroom and living/kitchen area. One was designated the Cavalier/Delt dorm. I can't remember how many Cavaliers we housed there, maybe up to 32?

Unfortunately, when we arrived for the fall semester, the construction was not complete. The school housed us in East Hall. The dorm was divided in the middle of each floor by plywood panels from wall to wall and ceiling to floor. They housed boys on the north side and girls on the south. There were at least four to a room, designed for two. The top floor of East Hall was a huge open attic and they housed dozens, mostly freshmen as I recall, on cots. Three lasting impressions from that experience - no air conditioning, fire codes violated, and multiple holes drilled in the plywood. Before the end of the semester, we moved into the Cavalier dorm. Jerry Wesson '62, Donald Jack Allen



'63, James Carr '62 and I lived downstairs left at the rightmost door of the three entry doors to the dorm.

The dorm was relatively guiet on the day of our induction on January 7, 1961, as we all prepared to caravan to Dallas in our finest garb. I had stayed up most of the night working on a drafting project and was somewhat ill prepared for the full experience of the day's activities. I had never stayed all dressed up for so long a period of time.
